DCV co-founder and beloved member, **Peg Simpson**, one of the last surviving witnesses to Lee Harvey Oswald's shooting

o commemorate six decades since the assassination of former President John F. Kennedy on November 22, 1963, 72 Films and National Geographic (NatGeo) have partnered to produce a docuseries, *JFK: One Day in America*, a

its innocence." The documentary features testimonials from the last living survivors who were at that fateful event including one of DCV's founding members, **Peg Simpson**. At the time, Peg was the only female Associated Press (AP) reporter working in Texas and was an eyewitness to the shooting of Lee Harvey Oswald.

A string of events led Peg to be an eyewitness to Oswald being shot.

According to Peg, her bureau chief insisted she attend Texas Governor, John Connally's, closed-to-the-press dinner that night, noting, "that was the way he planned to cover JFK's visit to Dallas." She began the day by getting her hair done and was planning to attend the Governor's event with a state legislator as her date. However, her plan changed when the President was assassinated as he rode in a motorcade through Dealey Plaza in downtown Dallas.

After the assassination, a British reporter tried to persuade her to join him in getting a taxi outside the Dallas city hall so they could track




the police car carrying Oswald to the county jail. Peg followed her instinct to stay put in the basement of the jail, which is where she witnessed Oswald being shot. She was also attuned to her instincts the day before, right after the JFK shooting. Peg stayed next to the police and listened to how events were unfolding as they communicated on their radios. This is how the AP got the first reports of a cop being shot [by Oswald] and the erroneous report that LBJ had a heart attack. At the time, Peg was 28 and by far the youngest AP reporter based in Dallas and among the pool of reporters who gathered there.

Peg shared, "I went on autopilot and left any personal reflections until later. I showed that I could take in the horror of the events but not dwell on

Board of Directors Update

ccording to the Village's
Bylaws, the Board of Directors
of Dupont Circle Village is responsible for the management of the
business and affairs of the Village and
"performs all lawful acts and things
for and on behalf of the Corporation."
That is legal language, for sure, but
one might ask "what does that mean
in practice?"

The Board of Directors is responsible for setting the policies that govern the Village's activities and operations. The Board also reviews those activities and operations through reports submitted by the President, the Executive Director, the Treasurer, and the various Committees and Task Forces of the Village. It is also responsible for setting the vision for the Village and creating a strategic plan to guide our operations. Through the President, the Board oversees and evaluates the work of the Executive Director.

The Board meets bimonthly for its formal meetings and often meets during alternate months for training or discussion of current issues. Board members are elected for a three-year term, which may be renewed for one additional three-year term. The officers of the Board are elected annually and include the President, the Vice

President, the Secretary, and the Treasurer.

Four years ago, the Board set forth a strategic plan to cover the years from 2020 up to 2024. That plan has served us well as we managed through the pandemic and

into an era of "new normalcy." Later this month, the Board will hold a retreat to review, revise, and update our strategic plan for the next four years. In connection with this, we have been conducting a DCV members survey to get members' feedback. Staff, leadership, committees, and task forces have been working on developing the plans for our future. Stay tuned for updates as our planning progresses.

As I noted in an email sent this past week, we are establishing a Nominating Committee to recommend individuals to fill vacancies on the Board. At this point, there is only one expected vacancy that will need to be filled. If you are interested in being considered to serve on this Nominating Committee or in being considered for the Board membership

I am very grateful to be serving as your President with such a dedicated group of board members. I am looking forward to our upcoming discussions as we plan the ways for the Village to serve our members and our community into the future.

ichael was born in Manhattan, near Columbia University. He ended up in DC as an undergraduate at Catholic University studying English Literature.


His job upon graduation was a high school English teacher. Michael then went on to become a business news reporter at the Gallagher Presidents Reporter, he covered business in every sector, focusing




Members enjoying the new Tai Chi class with master instructor, **Suzanne Christov**. It was a gorgeous day, and she taught the class outside.

learn. When Oswald was shot, I instinctively went for the phone on the desks and kept reporting..."

Peg had a long and successful career with AP, reporting for 17 years starting in 1962 in Dallas. In 1968, she transferred to Washington, DC to cover Congress and a southwestern regional beat.
